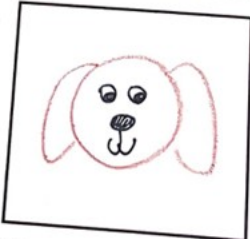
Which is better...

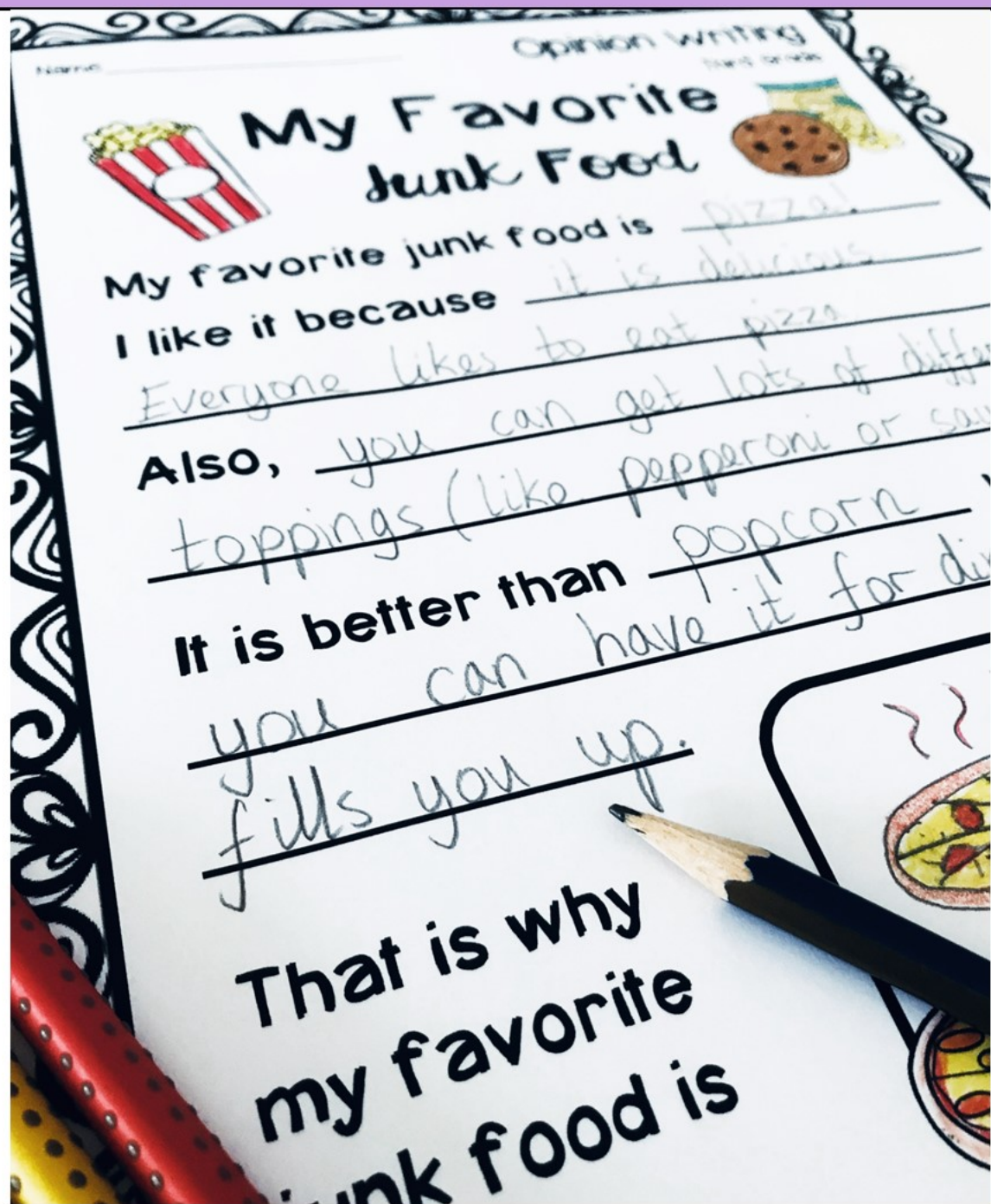
